The Struggle

We've seen and heard of the pain inflicted by this old world view whenever our country tries to rebloom. The past year was very painful with a clueless administration allowing so many to die. This coming on the heels of draconian policies of the previous years. White supremacy has always held "the others" back through redlining, housing, job, or education discrimination.
